DANIELA Alvarado

Chief Operating Officer at The Partnership for the Advancement of New Americans (PANA) As Chief Operating Officer, Daniela Alvarado is responsible for PANA's operational excellence and organizational growth. She oversees compliance, PANA's community-owned property development project, ensures financial stewardship, and supervises operations and facilities management. Before joining PANA, Daniela worked with previously incarcerated youth, provided community education on relationship violence, and led food justice initiatives.

As former Clinic Director of a Federally Qualified Health Center, Daniela brings over 9 years of extensive experience in social services, human rights, and healthcare, with a focus on preserving cultural practices and advocating for migrant and vulnerable populations.

Daniela was raised in the Imperial Valley by Mexican immigrant parents. Her personal and professional experiences deeply informed her commitment to social justice and dedication to working with marginalized communities to build a more just world for future generations. Daniela holds a Bachelor's degree in Psychology from San Diego State University and a Master's in Nonprofit Leadership and Management from the University of San Diego.



JACOB ALVARADO WAIPUK

Chair of Tribal Relations, Tribal Liaison, Division of Diversity and Innovation Jacob Alvarado Waipuk (tribal member from San Pasqual Kumeyaay) is part of the Kumeyaay Nation that resides in San Diego, California. His village is called San Pasqual or Amulkulkul in the Kumeyaay language Ipai Aa, "Language of the People." The name of his clan is called Waipuk, which means "kingsnake." The village was located originally in the San Pasqual Valley. On his father's side, he is Lipan Apache, and Sun Clan. He graduated from San Diego State University and received a Bachelor of Arts in American Indian Studies and studied abroad at The University of British Columbia where he focused on First Nations studies. During his time at SDSU, he was the president of the Native American Student Alliance.

Jacob also teaches the Kumeyaay language, songs, and traditions of the Kumeyaay Nation. He is currently in the JDP Doctor of Education, Educational Leadership at the University of California, San Diego and Cal State University, San Marcos where he focuses his research on schooling environments for indigenous youth, and the importance of indigenous teachings. He believes it's important to have a foundation of culture and traditions to help indigenous students succeed. He wants to create a school on San Pasqual Reservation that combines Kumeyaay teachings along with California state standards, so that we can keep our traditions alive. He has worked eleven years with the youth of the San Pasqual Education Department teaching them the Kumeyaay songs, language, stories, traditions, and way of life. Everything he does is for the youth of San Pasqual, and being in higher education pursuing a Doctor of Education is all for his people so that he can bring back what he learned and create educational pathways. He is here to help guide his people on and off campus to be successful and to never forget who they are and where they come from.



DR. NOORI BARKA

Founder of the Chaldean Community Council Dr. Noori Barka, Ph.D., is a distinguished Diagnostic Immunology expert focusing on immunoassay development and applications. With over 30 years of experience in In-Vitro Diagnostics and clinical and reference laboratories, Dr. Barka has made significant contributions to the field. He is the founder and Chief Scientific Officer (CSO) of Calbiotech, Inc., a company he established in 1998 to offer specialized immunoassay products for clinical and research use. His expertise lies in immunoassay manufacturing and custom design and production for human and animal applications.

In addition to his scientific achievements, Dr. Barka is deeply committed to community development and education. He founded two charter schools, the Chaldean Community Council, and Chaldean Radio, all based in El Cajon, CA. Dr. Barka's work has advanced the diagnostics field and significantly impacted the Chaldean community and beyond. He earned his Ph.D. in Diagnostic Immunology from Université catholique de Louvain in 1986, and his extensive skill set includes FDA compliance, drug discovery, clinical trials, assay development, and diagnostics.



JUAN CARLOS BLANCO

Afro-Cuban Drummer

In his exuberant Afro-Cuban movement and music classes, Juan Carlos Blanco enjoys transmitting cultural knowledge of his ancestors through engaging community activities that focus energy and express joy. It's hard not to have a smile on your face and a bounce in your step when visiting his classroom. At the same time, his teaching is not only about fun. Whether it's dancing or drumming, for him it is also important to take the time to explain and convey historical and cultural context. This, he believes, allows students to gain a well-rounded appreciation of the new skills and art form(s) they are learning.

Since coming to the United States, Mr. Blanco has been featured in various Afro-Cuban productions in the California area, as dancer and guest choreographer for groups such as Olorun, Alafia, and Taifa. Most recently was the musical director for Onstage Playhouse's 2021 production of "<u>A People's Cuban Christmas Tale.</u>"

Mr. Blanco has traveled throughout the United States teaching master workshops in Afro-Cuban percussion and dance. In the San Diego area, he has taught through community classes and institutions such as UCSD, Palomar College, Grossmont College, San Diego City College, and Cal State San Marcos. For many years, he has dedicated himself to teaching kindergarten through 8th-grade students at King-Chavez schools as well as students in the Sweetwater Union High School District. In Tijuana, Juan Carlos has also taught percussion and dance to elementary students at Escuela Primaria Miguel Guerrero, Primaria Guadalupe Victoria, and other schools through WorldBeat Center's bi-national cultural exchange partnership program with I.M.A.C. (Instituto Municipal de Arte y Cultura). His students have presented their work at community celebrations and festivals throughout the region

A seasoned community organizer, Kelsey approaches this sacred work as being inextricably linked to dream equity. She also beta tested possibility models of liberation as the founder of the Black Womxn Save My Life summit and the Black Womxn Deserve mutual aid fund.

She continues to show up as a cultural organizer through her projects Big Dream Energy and Black Dream Experiment, both are creative universes that explore dreaming as an ancestral, wellness and liberation practice.




FARIDA ERIKAT

Janice is the Co-founder and Executive Director of Mundo Gardens, a Resident Leadership Academy (RLA) facilitator, an advisory council member of the San Diego Food System Alliance, and an executive member of the Behavioral Health Advisory Board for the County of San Diego. Janice is also a co-founder of the National City Healthy Culturas Coalition and the founder of the first three community gardens in National City.

She continues her engagement and partnership in Southeast San Diego in co-hosting the Project New Village, People's Produce Mobile Farmers Market and teaching trauma informed environmental education in Southeast San Diego Elementary Schools with The Diamond Education Excellence Partnership program. She is a member of the AB 617 Portside Steering Committee in advocacy for clean air for coastal communities and accountability measures for corporations and government. It is part of her mission to mitigate climate change and the effects of pollution in communities of color in South San Diego. Her ongoing lifelong project is the National City & Southeast Green Corridor and Healthy Zone (Blue Zone) Initiative where the redress of harm of divisive infrastructure will lead to creating healthier communities that not only challenge health odds but defy it by increasing the length and quality of lives significantly.

Mapp is Kanien'kehá (Mohawk) and started her career as a reporter for Indian Time and The People's Voice, two newspapers on the Akwesasne reservation that straddles the border of Upstate New York and Ontario.

Since 2008, she has maintained a food, beverage, and travel blog called Off the Mapp. She previously served two terms as a board member of the San Diego Society of Professional Journalists and is a current member of SPJ, the San Diego Association of Black Journalists, the Indigenous Journalists Association, and the San Diego Press Club.

President and CEO of the International Community Foundation As the President and Chief Executive Officer of the International Community Foundation (ICF), Marisa leads the continuing evolution of ICF's model of co-powering communities and strengthening vulnerable natural habitats.

Marisa has served ICF in many roles. She was previously the Vice President of Culture and Impact, overseeing a growing portfolio of programs and special initiatives. Prior to that role, she was Senior Program Officer for Environmental Conservation, leading ICF's Environment portfolio, emphasizing marine and terrestrial conservation in the Baja California peninsula, coastal communities of the Gulf of California and the Caribbean. Marisa first joined ICF in 2015, after 7 years at The San Diego Foundation. There, she worked with regional leaders to advance conservation efforts that ensured community access to clean air, water, and nature, while promoting collaborative action on climate change. Her work at the San Diego Foundation led to the creation of the Parks for Everyone report and the Opening the Outdoors Initiative.

Marisa's dedication to community action at the local, regional, and national levels is demonstrated by her many leadership roles. She is a co-founder of the San Diego Latina Giving Circle and currently serves on the board of Olivewood Gardens and Learning Center. She has served on the Advisory Board for the Nonprofit Institute at the University of San Diego, the Center for Diversity and the Environment, and is the outgoing Board Chair for the Environment Grantmakers Association. Her commitment to working in service and incommunity with refugees stems from her own refugee experience. Ramla was born in Somalia and came to the United States with her family as a young child and grew up in City Heights, San Diego.



JOEY WILLIAMS

Senior Program Manager at The California Endowment: Power and Infrastructure Team – Native Power Building Joey Williams, a member of the Nuwa (Kawaiisu) people out of the Kern Valley Indian Community, began organizing over 15 years ago as a youth pastor working to dismantle the school to jail & prison pipeline in Bakersfield. He has been a product of the foster care, jail, and probation system since age 7. Joey committed his life to bringing people of color, young people, and disenfranchised targeted communities off the sidelines and into the big fight for good jobs, quality education, and ending mass incarceration and police brutality.

Joey is the former Co-Vice Chair of the LA County Cares First Community Investment Advisory Board-CFCI (Measure J) representing the Native American Community, which is allocating \$100 million from the LA County Sheriff's Department, and investing back in the communities they have harmed. Joey is formerly the Director of Organizing at the CA Native Vote Project, and is committed to dismantling White Supremacy, and building Native Power so that all our people can be free, self-determined, and live the full life their Creator intended.



NOVIEN YARBER

Learning Officer, The Prebys Foundation; Senior Research Associate, The Nonprofit Institute Novien Yarber, affectionately known as "Dr. Novi," is a San Diego-based civic leader, educator, and creative artist—a multifaceted practitioner. Today, he serves as Senior Learning Officer at the Prebys Foundation, continuing to fashion his unique role in community impact through leadership and learning, both being expressions of creative artistry.
